# **Academic Audit Report**

#### **Alumni Feedback:**

Students were provided 13 questions questionnaires. Offline feedback was collected from 100 students. After the analysis of these questionnaires, it is observed that 90% students are satisfied with the admission procedure and fee structure. Students also gave very good response about overall environment of the college. They are also satisfied about infrastructural and lab facilities. It is noticed that 95% students have given satisfactory response about library facilities. Only 3% alumni students recorded unsatisfactory response about academic activities. 93% students were satisfied about extracurricular activities. 92% students have given very good opinion about overall rating of the college.

Some of the significant suggestions given by the alumni include post graduate department in Commerce, Marathi, Hindi, English, Economics, and Special attention to sports, transportation arrangement for rural students.

### Feedback of Students about Teachers:

The Student Feedback about teachers was collected from 163 students from B.A. II, III and B.Com. II, III students on the basis of 5 point scale questionnaire. The questionnaire comprising 25 questions sought responses on the scale – Excellent, Very Good, Good, Average and Below Average. The analysis of the feedback reflects feedback of students in regards with the teachers' language competency, command on their subject, skill of explaining complex concepts, motivating skill, evaluation techniques, etc. Above 55 % students rated teachers as excellent or very good or good for maximum number of questions.

#### **Feedback of Teachers:**

The feedback was collected from 43 Teachers – 12 Full time faculty and 31 Assistant Professors (CHB) belonging to Arts, Commerce and Science Programmes on the basis of 4 point scale questionnaire. The questionnaire comprising 22 questions sought responses on the scale – Strongly Agree, Agree, Disagree and Strongly Disagree. 53.5% faculty strongly agreed that the courses / syllabi taught by them have a fair balance of theory and application while 39.5 % agreed with the same. 60.5 % faculty recorded their strong agreement with the clear and well defined objectives and course outcomes of the syllabi they teach. 51.2 % strongly agreed that the curricula they teach includes current trends in the subjects while 42% recorded their agreement with the inclusion of current trends in curricula. 53.5% faculty strongly agreed that the curricula address the cross-cutting issues like professional ethics, human values, gender equality, environment, etc. whereas 39.5% recorded their agreement to it. 67.4% responded that they complete the syllabus allotted to them within the stipulated time. Regarding the relevance of the books and journals prescribed as reference materials, 48.8% recorded their strong agreement, while 48.8 % stated their agreement to it. 55.8% faculty strongly believed that the courses/syllabi taught by them increase their interest, knowledge, and perspective in their subject area. Regarding the freedom given to faculty to adopt new techniques/ strategies of teaching such as group discussion, seminar, presentations, etc., 51.2% recorded their strong agreement while 48.8% faculty recorded their disagreement to it. Similarly, 51.2% responded that they have freedom to adopt strategies of evaluating and assessing the students. 53.5% faculty agreed that prescribed books are available in the library in sufficient number while 42% registered their strong agreement to it. 58.1% faculty strongly agreed that reference books and journals related to their subject are available in the library. 55.8% faculty strongly responded that they encourage students to visit library and refer books for additional reading and no faculty recoded their disagreement to it. 53.5% faculty found strongly agree with the statement that they give encouragement to the students to participate in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities and guide them whenever needed and also to the fact that the welfare / extension activities like mentorship programme, counselling, monetary help, NSS, etc. are effectively and efficiently run in the college. 46.5% faculty strongly felt that the environment in the college is conducive to teaching and research. Regarding the teacher friendly and cooperative administration 55.8% recorded their strong agreement while 37.2% found agreeing with the statement. As far as the administration is concerned, 46.5% strongly agreed that the administration provides ample opportunities and support to faculty to upgrade their skills and qualification. 41.9% responded strongly that the ICT facilities in the college are adequate and satisfactory while 41.9% faculty responded that they make use of it in the college. 55.8% recorded their strong agreement regarding the sincere execution of their duties as a coordinator/ chairperson /member of administrative / college committees while no faculty recorded their dissent to it. Regarding organising workshops/seminars/ webinars/ conferences/ lectures in the college, 53.5% strongly stated their agreement. 55.8% strongly agreed that they strive hard to accomplish the vision and mission of the college.

### **Students' Feedback about College:**

Student Feedback was collected from 53 students from B.A. and B.Com. II and III students and M.A students on the basis of 3 point scale questionnaire. The questionnaire comprising 20 questions sought responses on the scale – Satisfactory, Not Satisfactory and Moderately Satisfied. 75.5 % students registered their satisfaction towards the usefulness of course syllabus for their fure career.77.4% students recorded satisfactory responses about quality of teaching in the college. 80 % students stated their satisfaction regarding the expertise of the teachers and their accessibility. 79.2% students were satisfied with the regularity in the organization of seminars / discussion and special guidance while 20.08 % students are Moderately Satisfied. 68% students recorded their satisfaction over the use of ICT in the class. 79.2% rated their satisfaction over the usefulness of skill development courses for their financial independence while 20.08 % students are moderately satisfied. 85 % students responded that the activities are appropriate to their holistic development while 77% felt that satisfaction about NSS programmes conducted by the college are satisfactory. 68% and 64%

students registered their satisfaction with reference to availability of equipment and felicities in the laboratories as well as guidance of faculty during experiments respectively. 83% students expressed satisfaction for the sports facilities and encouragement from the college. 79 % students were satisfied with the library and appreciated the usefulness of books and other reading material available in the library for their academic and additional reading. 77% students appreciated cooperation from the office staff and help from Students Welfare Committee regarding procurement of scholarships, financial help, etc. 81% recorded their satisfaction about drinking water, canteen, washrooms, etc. provisions in the college; while 85% students registered their satisfaction over the attempts of the college for the overall development of the students.

## **II.** Teaching, Learning and Evaluation:

# 1. The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

The aptitude of the students, their liking and performance at previous qualifying exam is considered while admitting students to particular courses/ programmes. Advanced learners and slow learners are identified through general ability test across all programmes/courses, as also through interactions in the class room and/or laboratory.

## Advanced learners are provided with:

- 1. Facilities like Library Merit Card, Book-Bank
- 2. Given more challenging academic tasks and special guidance
- 3. Performance is monitored to ensure incremental development
- 4. Encouragement to participate in curricular and co-curricular activities (preparing wall-papers, informative articles on social, economic, health, political, issues)
- 5. Participation in essay writing, elocution competitions, quizzes etc.
- 6. Presenting research projects at University Research Fest Awishkar.

#### Slow learners are provided with:

- 1. Remedial coaching and adequate writing practice in the form of tests, question papers etc.
- 2. Digital study material, audio/video lectures for performance improvement

Poor socio-economic, educational background, familial responsibilities resulting from marriage are major hindrances for our students who are mostly rural girl students. Initiatives like prizes and skill development courses enhance employability and prove to be good incentives.

# 6. Annual Examination Report

In the year 2022-23the University exams were conducted in offline mode with descriptive type of answers. The change from objective to descriptive mode of exam after two years did affect the performance of the students, especially languages (literature). Out of 209 students admitted in B.A. III, B.Com. III and M.A.II, 192 students appeared for the examination. 132 students completed their graduation successfully. The result of B.A. III programme was not quite satisfactory but that of B.Com. III programme was good. The passing percentage of B.A. III and B.Com. III was 50.00% and 85.71% respectively. The result of M.A./M.Sc. Geography was 100% The total pass percentage was 68.75 %

#### 7. Student Satisfaction Survey

114 students across all classes participated in the students' satisfaction survey consisting of 15 questions covering various aspects of the teaching- learning process, evaluation process, mentoring, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, personality development and employability enhancement initiatives undertaken by the college. A link of the google form was provided to the students and responses were sought. The graphical analysis of the

responses is already given above. Here is a brief paragraph regarding the interpretation of the data.

More than 97% respondents are satisfied with the performance of the college regarding teaching-learning process and evaluation. The students acknowledged the and role of their mentors and follow-up taken by them. They strongly approved of the encouragement provided by the teachers for participation in extra-curricular activities. A similar response is seen regarding the use of evaluation methods. 94.73% respondents felt that the teachers used student centric methods in teaching-learning. An equal number of respondents are of the opinion that internal evaluation is undertaken regularly. We reiterate our pursuit of excellence and plan to undertake / devise newer means to enhance our score furthermore in these areas.

95.61% respondents have rated the overall quality of teaching-learning process as good and acknowledged that the college provides them with multiple opportunities to learn and grow.
